## Launch of the Bluebell Circuit

A Celebration for Two Mile Ash on the Afternoon of Saturday 23rd April

The Two Mile Ash Bluebell Circuit is now fully open and its use is steadily increasing. Its centre-piece is that 11m footbridge but this 750m recreational way offers far more.

Seen 'in the round', it is a combination of stream crossing, paths through two very different woodlands, landscaped 'jitties' linking adjacent housing areas, two public greens and an ecological corridor. Together with its wider links to other routes, it provides scope for a daily ten minute stroll (or longer walks through its connections), as well as access to nature across the seasons.

Working with our partner, Milton Keynes Parks Trust, TMAEG volunteers have been enhancing the Circuit, through the insertion of new sections of all-weather path, the upgrading of older paths, and tree and wildflower planting. ## A Diverse Range of Projects

TMAEG has been particularly busy over the winter and spring periods as our pictures below will show.





The Two Planters on TMA's 'piazza' - the Park Gateway – off the High Street are maintained jointly by TMAEG with their owners, the Dental Practice and Hair Culture. TMAEG's main task is to change over the planting. This season's display is particularly eye-catching.
